Meet Bill Underwood of Missouri Valley, Iowa, a former B-17 copilot. He came with pictures, a few stories, and a deep admiration for the old bird. Mr. Underwood flew 28 combat missions, then upgraded to aircraft commander. However, the war ended before he could fly a combat mission as an aircraft commander.


In addition to photos, Mr. Underwood came with a list of the missions he flew. He is the fellow in the middle with his dog tags shining. In case the missions are hard to read—he flew 28 missions between 8 Jan and 21 April of 1945. The targets he flew to included Berlin, Frankfurt, and Dresden.

Mr. Underwood also mentioned that the B-17 he flew never had a name. But, he recognized the big "H" on Fuddy Duddy as belonging to his unit..

I felt honored to talk to Mr. Underwood and his wife. It looked to me as if this visit rekindled memories of a time when the world's future was uncertain. It was a time when men not only bonded together on the ground, but also thousands of feet in the air inside a cold, loud aircraft bound for a hostile country. Thanks Mr. & Mrs. Underwood for your service.

Fire Extinguishers in "T" Hangars by Mike Howard

As mentioned at the last meeting, Mike Howard did some research on the type of fire extinguishers needed in hangars at Millard.

- 1. The rental agreement rules section 6.21(12) states "each T hanger will have a minimum of one 20BC rated fire extinguisher."
- 2. NFPA defines the following class types for portable fire extinguishers: Class A wood, cloth, and paper; Class B combustible liquids; Class C electrical fires.
- 3. Some wood, cloth or paper is stored in the T hangers. These materials may be a part of the aircraft itself or a shipping container for oil or aircraft parts. In either case, it seems appropriate to have a fire extinguisher on hand that is capable of fighting a fire that is feeding on this type of fuel.
- 4. The portable fire extinguishers in most T hangers at Millard airport are of the dry chemical type and are filled with either sodium bicarbonate or potassium bicarbonate. Those that are rated B&C only are still filled with either of these materials.
- 5. On June 6, 2005 Michael A. Howard P.E. had a phone conversation with Pio Porta the Assistant Fire Marshall for the City of Omaha. Fire Marshall Porta stated that "a 3A 40BC fire extinguisher exceeds the minimum rating of a 20 BC fire extinguisher and a 4A 60BC is larger still".
- 6. Therefore, a 3A 40BC or 4A 60BC portable fire extinguisher meets the requirement of the T hanger rental agreement rules.
