

FAA Launches Lessons Learned Library. Recently, FAA launched a new online accidents lessons learned library. The Web site highlights significant accidents and shows what we can learn from them. 11 accidents are in the library (including Air Florida 90, ValuJet 592, and USAir 427). The goal is to have 40 accidents included by the end of 2009. While these accidents currently cover only transport airplanes, many of the principles involved, such as decisionmaking, weather, fuel exhaustion, midairs, and ground incursions are equally applicable to GA operations. 
